	Wildfire risk and response costs continue to rise across the West - straining budgets, testing capacity, and driving urgent legislative action. This session builds on Pew's "Wildfires: Burning Through State Budgets" report and WFLC's True Cost of Wildfire report.
	This would be a focused discussion on what has been tried, what has worked (or hasn't), and what's next. We'll explore state-level innovations in wildfire budgeting, investments in suppression, prevention, and mitigation, and opportunities for cross-state learning and identify potential needs to support these efforts.
